Putney School in Vermont in 1942, joining the army shortly thereafter to serve in India and China during World War II. He became the youngest 1st Lieutenant in the Army. Upon discharge from the Army in 1946, he returned to Los Angeles to attend UCLA. In 1947, he married Dorothy Anne Cleary, the daughter of close family friends James and Budie Cleary who had named her after Lathrop's mother. He graduated from UCLA in 1950 with a degree in banking and finance.

During college he supported himself in part by making jewelry (the Lathrop Gray Co), which he continued as a hobby throughout his life. After college he began in the automobile business with the PGH Company, selling Studebakers from

the downtown Los Angeles dealership which he acquired in 1953. When Studebaker closed in the United States, he established Hoffman Tile, manufacturing ceramic tile in Claremont.

In 1971, he purchased the Volkswagen dealership on Sierra Avenue in Fontana. Since then, he has owned franchises for Acura, Alfa Romeo, Audi, Buick, Cadillac, Chevrolet, Chrysler, Daihatsu, Dodge, Fiat, GMC, Harley-Davidson, Honda, Isuzu, Jeep, Lincoln-Mercury, Maserati, Mazda, Oldsmobile, Pontiac, Porsche, Ram, Saturn, Subaru and

Volkswagen. Over the years, he had stores in Fontana, Los Angeles, Long Beach, Monrovia, Duarte, Alhambra, Riverside, San Luis Obispo, Fort Bragg and Eureka. He has been an influential dealer throughout, serving on many dealer association boards and dealer advertising boards. He was always a good neighbor dealer, supporting the communities he served and representing the retail automobile industry in a positive way.

He was a founder and board member of the Bank of Monrovia, which became Granite State Bank and was later acquired by Citizens Business Bank.

His community involvement ranged from serving as an advisor to the local redevelopment agency, participating in service clubs, serving as president of the Chamber of Commerce and giving financial support to many organiza-

tions, including the Boys and Girls Club, local police and fire departments, schools, little league and soccer teams, hospitals and the Monrovia Public Library. He was also an avid golfer and active member of the San Gabriel Country Club for many years. He was a long-time thoroughbred horse owner and breeder and a familiar face at the Santa Anita Park racetrack. When he was 16 years old, his brother Hallock taught him to fly. He loved flying and was an accomplished pilot, with a license to fly single and multi-engine aircraft. He obtained his helicopter license when he was 79.

He is survived by his wife of over 66 years, Dorothy, and his sisters Barbara Henry (Richard) and Kiriki De Diego Metzo

> and seven children, Mary Lathrop Fahey (Jack), Peter Hoffman (Toni), Michael Hoffman (Rene), Elizabeth Hoffman, Thomas Hoffman (Ellen), Marguerite Winnacott (Neal) and Patricia Juett (Dennis). Tax Depreciation Bill Advances

The United States Senate Finance Committee reported April 3 legislation that would extend expired or expiring tax provisions for race horses, including a provision to extend the three-year recovery period.

This provision—originally passed by Congress and enacted into law in 2008—accelerates, simplifies, and makes uniform the depreciation period for race horses. The provision expired at the end of 2013 along with several other tax provisions. —continued at www.BloodHorse.com.





Health Problems In Newborn Foals

A foal's birth marks the start of something exciting: a new partner to train, a clean slate with which to begin, and potential just waiting to be tapped. But something exciting can quickly turn to something disappointing if that foal isn't healthy.

At the 2014 Kentucky Breeders' Short Course, held February 8 in Lexington, Bonnie Barr, VMD, Dipl. ACVIM, an equine internal medicine specialist at Rood & Riddle Equine Hospital, also in Lexington, reviewed four common health problems newborn foals face. Transporting Your Horse In A Warmer Climate

There are many issues to consider when you're planning to transport your horse, especially if he's moving to a hot and humid climate. Veterinarians often talk about 'acclimatization' and how a horse must have enough time to acclimatize to a new weather pattern after moving to a different region. But acclimatization is not just about time or simply letting the horse "get used to it"; rather, it's more about how we can help prepare our horse for this change.

As the world gets smaller (or warmer!) and we transport our horses to various countries for competition, breeding, or training, a good working knowledge of how we can make this transition more comfortable and safe is essential.

Water and Electrolytes: Horses need these two items both to maintain body function and to produce sweat—the main avenue whereby horses can lower body temperature through evaporation. Evaporation comprises 60 percent of the body's ability to lower body temperature; the remaining 25 percent is by expiration (through the lungs) and 15 percent by convection. If a horse is dehydrated and does not consume enough electrolytes, we often see them lose their ability to sweat.

Panting Horse: Heavy panting is a sign of hyperthermia.

To compensate, the horse's heart rate might increase as he tries to bring the heated blood to the skin and his respiratory rate might increase as he tries to lose heat through the lungs.—continued at www.Blooodhorse.com, By World Equine Veterinary Association, By Siraya Chunekamrai, DVM, PhD

Feeding Horses For Sales Preparation

Nutrition has an important role in sales preparation for all horses. If you want to maximize the value of the horse, it is essential to have the horse looking its best at sale time.

There are a number of key elements including the following:

Size and body condition: Young borses being prepped for

Size and body condition: Young horses being prepped for sale should be on a smooth growth curve to avoid growth spurts and to reach optimum height at sale time. Size for appropriate age is a plus for most disciplines, and the sale

horse should normally have a body condition score at five or slightly higher (on a nine-point scale).

Muscle, not fat: The modern sale ring rewards horses that have well-developed muscles rather than just being fat. Thin is not good, but obese is not desired.

Mini-Microchips For Horses Get Thumbs Up

The techie trend toward tinier-than-tiny microanything has now hit the world of equine identification. Horses necessitating microchip identification a requirement in many countries, including the entire European Union—can now receive a "minimicrochip" implant.

Roughly 70 percent the size of the standard microchip, the mini-microchip "obviously works very well" and has clear benefits for the horse, explained Christine Aurich, DVM, PhD, Head of the Graf Lehndorff Institute for Equine Science in Neustadt, Germany.

"It's certainly better to insert a smaller needle than the one that was used for the 'old' chip," Aurich said. "Therefore, the mini-chip should substitute the old transponder from now on."—continued at www.theHorse.com, By Christa Lesté-Lasserre




